

Keeping your centre informed...?


Let your AM know when you have got into the college. Let the AM know when you have left to return to the centre?



DIRECTIONS

The drop off point is on St Aldate's St. Walk up the street and turn right through the black metal gates into Christ Church Meadow. Once you have walked through the flower garden you will come to a large open area.

Christ Church College is the building on your left



Continue along Christ Church
Meadow, until just past
Christchurch College, then turn
left down the path there. At the
end of this path go through the
kissing gate (black metal gate).

One activity leader should go through first to make sure the group doesn't block the path.

Continue to the end of the lane and turn right onto Merton St.

Continue along Merton St. until you reach Merton College.



Next, follow Merton St. until the end (it will curve to the left 3/4 of the way along) and turn right onto the High St. Cross to the left side at the pedestrian crossing and continue down the High St to reach Magdalen College.

tower at 6 am every May Day (1st of May).


Famous Alumni include King Edward VIII,

DIRECTIONS

Walk back along the High St. towards the town centre. Then take a right onto Catte St. (it is the 3rd right, a pedestrianised lane with a tree next to it)

Continue up this small lane and you will find the Radcliffe Camera (4b): the large round building in the middle, and...

The Bodleian Library (4a): The large stone building at the far end of the square.

FAST FACTS

BODLEIAN LIBRARY

WHEN? It first opened in 1602.

WHAT? One of the oldest libraries in Europe, one of six UK libraries which receives a copy of every book published in the UK

RADCLIFFE CAMERA

WHEN? It was built between 1737-1749
WHAT? Originally the Radcliffe Science Library, now it is an extension of the Bodleian Library.

POINTS OF INTEREST

The Radcliffe Camera and Bodleian Library

are connected by a two-storey underground

tunnel finished in 1912.


In the Victorian era the tunnels underneath

the library used to contain a prison cell

used by the university's police.

SHELDONIAN THEATRE





DIRECTIONS

After this continue up the right side of the Bodleian. Just beyond the library building will be a black metal gate on the left, go through it*: the Sheldonian Theatre (5) is the large circular building in front of you.

*If this gate is closed, or anyone in your group is unable to easily use the stairs, then continue straight until you reach a crossroads and turn left onto Broad St (black dotted line). The Sheldonian will be on your left, behind the black metal gates with large stone head sculptures on top.

3. The theatre was built to replace an earlier building which was considered unsuitable to the students' noisy partying at graduation and degree ceremonies, what was this first building?

A church! (St Mary-the-Virgin-on-High)

- 1. The theatre has been used for music concerts, lectures and university ceremonies since it was built in 1664, when was the first play shown here? 2015 the Christ Church Dramatic society put on the Crucible

A roof – they wanted to copy the Roman style of theatre with no roof



FAST FACTS

WHEN?


Built in 1664 following designs by Sir Christopher Wren, his first major construction

WHAT?

The official ceremonial hall of the University of Oxford. It is named after Gilbert Sheldon, who was Chancellor of the Universitywhen the theatre was built.

POINTS OF INTEREST

Two of the ceremonies which happen here are: matriculation – the official ceremony of acceptance for all Oxford students and Congregation – the university's parliament.



Continue along Broad St. Cross onto the right side before the end. Next turn right onto Magdalen St East. At the end of the street, turn left and cross the road to reach the Ashmolean Museum

FAST FACTS

WHEN?

Opened in 1683 to display the collection of Elias Ashmole. The current building was made between 1841 and 1845.

WHAT?

The first museum in the world, with a collection of amazing artefacts

POINTS OF INTEREST

The museum is still collecting artefacts: in 2017 they got a Viking hoard of 200 coins found in Oxfordshire

They also have the lantern Guy Fawkes' used in the Gunpowder plot. At midnight on the 4th November 1605 Guy Fawkes' was caught under the houses of parliament with 36 barrels of gunpowder, and a lantern.



Next exit Beaumont street the way you came and turn right, heading towards the town centre. Continue straight until you reach St Michael at the North Gate Church.



The tower was completed in 1040

WHAT?

Oxford's oldest building – an Anglo-Saxon church

POINTS OF INTEREST

Its name comes from the fact that the North Gate of the city walls used to be nearby.



Continue straight until you reach the end of the pedestrianised zone, Carfax Tower (8) will be on your right.

ENTRANCES INFO?

TAKE NOTE:

After this point, set a meeting point and time before sending the students off for free time, Westgate shopping centre has lots of different shops and toilet facilities.

(Avoid immediately outside Carfax tower: all the summer schools use it as a meeting point and it gets very busy)

CARFAX TOWER

WHEN?

Built in the 12th century, originally as part of a church

WHAT?

A large tower at the very centre of Oxford, its name come from the French carrefour meaning crossroads

POINTS OF INTEREST

The rest of the church was demolished in 1896 to make room for more traffic There are 99 steps to reach the top of the tower.
